Biography/Background

Leroy R. Jacobs grew up in Birmingham, Alabama, graduated from Harvard University, and then worked for the *Birmingham News* until the United States entered World War I. In 1917, he was commissioned as a second lieutenant. A year later Jacobs went to Europe where he fought in the Second Battle of the Marne. After receiving treatment for an injury he sustained during the battle, Jacobs was granted an honorable discharge. He returned to Birmingham and worked as a reporter for the *Birmingham News* and the *Age-Herald*. Leroy Jacobs died in 1936.

Scope and Content

The bulk of this collection centers on Leroy R. Jacobs, specifically his participation in World War I, including letters (1917 to 1918), newspaper clippings, and military documents. The remainder of the collection relates to other members of the Jacobs family and consists of postcards, letters, and several unidentified photographs.

1740.1.4	Orders from Fort Oglethorpe Training Camp, Georgia for Second Lieutenant Leroy R. Jacobs to report for active service to the 38 th Infantry at Camp Greene, Charlotte, North Carolina, November 27, 1917.
1740.1.5	Letter from "The Michael Family" to Ben M. Jacobs extending congratulations for Leroy Jacobs' commission, December 10, 1917.
1740.1.6	Correspondence, January 1918. Letters from Leroy Jacobs to his family, in which he stated that he doubted he would get the chance to see action in Europe before the war ended.
1740.1.7	Correspondence, February - March 1918. Letters written by Leroy R. "Simon" Jacobs to his family prior to being sent to Europe and telegraphs from Ben M. Jacobs to his son Leroy M. Jacobs.
1740.1.8	Letter from Victor H. Hanson to Jake (Leroy R. Jacobs), in which Hanson, the publisher for the <i>Birmingham</i> <i>News</i> , assures Leroy Jacobs that he his welcome to continue working at the <i>News</i> upon his return from military service, March 4, 1918.
1740.1.9	Letter to Mr. Martin Egan, American Expeditionary Force, France recommending Leroy Jacobs for work at headquarters. States that Leroy Jacobs "is a chap of the very highest character. He is a graduate of

	Harvard and has good Newspaper experience." Signed "Chairmen", May 29, 1918.
1740.1.10	Letter from Leroy R. Jacobs to "Jim", in which Leroy wrote of the second battle of the Marne, his impressions of German soldiers, and his injury, July 27, 1918, France.
1740.1.11	Letter from Private Alexander MacLauren to Lieutenant Jacobs. MacLauren wrote of serving with Jacobs in France and the end of the war, December 8, 1918, France.
1740.1.12	Orders for Jacobs to report to St Aignan-Noyers "for the purpose of being returned to the U.S." November 19, 1918. Telegraph informing Ben M. Jacobs that Leroy Jacobs has been officially reported as being slightly wounded, December 3, 1918.
1740.1.13	Letter from Leroy R. Jacobs to his parents, in which he wrote that he was awaiting orders to be sent home, December 8, 1918.
1740.1.14	Newspaper clipping from the Birmingham News regarding Leroy Jacobs being wounded in action, undated.
1740.1.15	Excerpts from the war diary of the 389 th Infantry Regiment, July 14, 1918 - July 18, 1918. Excerpts from the war diary of the 47 th (German) Infantry Regiment, July 15, 1918 - July 16, 1918.
